REGISTRATION AND EQUIPMENT FORMS

- Each ringer, whether attending as a member of a choir or as an individual ringer, must complete a registration form. Be sure to indicate your workshop choices on this form. A completed registration form must be received from each ringer in order to ensure a confirmation of registration. (Just because your director has indicated on the equipment form you are attending doesn't save you a spot.)
- If you are attending as an individual, be sure to indicate your preference of ringing position on the registration form. Every effort will be made to accommodate your 1st choice and to inform you of your position in time for you to prepare your levels and massed ringing music.
- If your choir is attending and is able to bring bells and/or chimes and foams, one equipment form is required. This form should be completed by the director or an appointed choir representative.
- If you are attending as an individual ringer and are able to bring bells and/or chimes and foams, an equipment form is required.
- It would be very helpful if individual ringers could bring complete sets of bells, chimes, and foams. This will help with workshop setups.
- Please clearly mark all your equipment that you are bringing. Please note that all equipment can be safely stored in the church gymnasium overnight on Saturday for pick up between 8am and 9:15am on Sunday if this is of help to you.

 - Saturday lunch and refreshment break



CONDUCTOR BIOGRAPHIES

DR. JOHN HOOPER, COMOX, BC LEVEL 3-4, MASSED RINGING



Dr. John Hooper, Professor Emeritus from Concordia University in Edmonton, Alberta, founded its handbell program, including the Concordia Handbell Ensemble, Jubiloso! and the Ringspiration summer program. All of them performed on the largest set of handbells and handchimes in Canada.

Conducting massed handbell ensembles, he represented Canada at International Handbell Symposia in Brisbane, Osaka, and Vancouver, and guest conducted at Belleship and International Handbell Festival in Hong Kong, National Residential Ringing Week in Great Britain, the National Festival in Japan, and Handbell Asia Festival in Malaysia, as well as Canada's national festival, The Ringing Link, and Classic Bronze in Edmonton, Alberta.

Dr. Hooper remains an active adjudicator and workshop leader. His work as an examiner for the London College of Music of the University of West London has taken him throughout southeast and south-central Asia as well as Africa and the Middle East. His adjudication work includes festivals in Singapore, Spain, Indonesia, Australia, Hong Kong, and Malaysia as well as home in Canada. He has also developed and led professional development workshops in foundational conducting, rehearsal approaches, expressive musicianship, and techniques for choir and handbells.

He has written and arranged music for handbells, choirs, and other instruments. Several of his works have won the Fred Merrett Contest for New Compositions sponsored by the Alberta Guild of English Handbell Ringers, including *Introspection, Intrada, Gathering, Toccata*, and *Agnus Dei*, the latter two published by From the Top Publishing. *Passacaglia Chromatica* was honoured by Portland, Oregon's Bells of the Cascades in their Composition Contest. *Toccata* was the Canadian composition featured at the International Handbell Symposium in Liverpool, and *Gathering* was performed by the Festival Choir at the International Handbell Symposium in Vancouver.

Dr. Hooper is presently the music director of Island Voices, an auditioned, mixed chamber choir based in Courtenay/Campbell River on B.C.'s Vancouver Island, a position he has held since 2021. He has served on the board of the Alberta Guild of English Handbell Ringers and the Handbell Musicians of Canada.



JANET NORDSTRAND, M.Ed, PORT MOODY, BC LEVELS 1-2, MASSED RINGING

Janet teaches Kindergarten to Grade 7 Music at École Inman in Burnaby School District. Winner of the British Columbia Music Educators' Association Elementary Professional Award in 2016, Janet provides musical experiences in Orff, Choral, Recorder, Guitar, Ukulele. Handbells, Handchimes and Musical Theatre.

In addition to her teaching, Janet is in her last year directing Sound Wave Handbell Choir, her Burnaby District extra-

curricular ensemble since 1999. Winners of the 2019 CBC Canadian Music Class Competition, Sound Wave has been a passion and joy to work with youth from many different schools in Grades 6 to 12. As of January 2025 Janet is the new director of Resilience Ringers - a community adult handbell choir.

Janet is pleased to be back on the podium in BC again in Vernon. A career highlight was directing 750 ringers in a mass choir at the International Handbell Symposium in Vancouver in July, 2016.

An active clinician, she has presented workshops on topics of interest at the provincial, national and international handbell conferences as well as the national Orff conference.

Currently Secretary of the Burnaby Music Educator Association, she is a past board member of Phoenix Choir and the British Columbia Guild of English Handbell Ringers.

A chorister at heart, Janet currently sings with her church choir and is a past member for 19 years with Phoenix Chamber Choir.

Janet lives in Port Moody with her husband Ray, and their dog Belle.

KNOW YOUR LEVEL

We celebrate ringers at all levels! Newer ringers usually are at Level 1 or Level 2 or somewhere in between. Some ringers who have been ringing a long time are at Level 2 and very happy to be there. Some ringers are at Level 3, 4, 5 or even 6. There is as much value in attending this conference whether you are a Level 1 ringer or a Level 4 ringer. Spring Rings are held to help all of us improve our ringing ability, meet and spend time with people who enjoy ringing as much as we do, experience different parts of the province, and have FUN!

Experience from past Spring Rings has shown us that it is so important for you to accurately identify your level. If ringers underestimate their ability, they are not as challenged and do not get as much from Spring Ring. If ringers overestimate their ability, they are often challenged beyond their ability to learn and master the music leading to frustration and often discouragement.

Rehearsing and Choosing the Music for a Mixed Levels Choir

What do you do? You need to keep the more experienced ringers challenged and learning so you want to have them in Level 3. At the same time, you do not want to stress out the newer ringers with music that is beyond what they can accomplish successfully.

For example: You have 2 brand new ringers, 3 experienced ringers and 6 in-between ringers.

A few suggestions follow:

Looking at the 6 in-between ringers – you can decide which songs would be best to do as a full choir in your own community. However, for Spring Ring, you want the 3 experienced plus maybe 2 from the in-between group to play at the Level 3 as they are ready to be challenged at that level and the other ringers should stay with the Level 1/2.

How does that work for practice??

For instance, you might choose the Level 1/2 pieces for the whole choir to learn as everyone would be able to learn these and play them well for performance. As for the 5 ringers going into Level 3, only buy music for the 5 of them. For a 2-hour practice, use the last ½ hour to practice with the Level 3's only. Or maybe the last 15 minutes and then have them stay an extra 15. Or you may want to ask some of the "in between" people to read off their music to fill in for spots that are missing and make it an hour practice. If your ringers going into Level 3 are ready for that level they will also be able to do some practice at home on their own. Or maybe they need some one-on-one time with the director to work over a few tough spots. Look at each ringer individually and decide which level would be most appropriate for that ringer. Whatever you decide, have fun with it.

To assist you in determining the level at which you should be registering, here is a short description of Levels 1 through 5 as described by Handbell Musicians of America.

Work with your conductor to determine the best level and music choice for you at this Spring Ring.

Level 1

- Meter is limited to 4/4, 3/4, 2/4, common time
- Notes and rest values are whole, half, dotted-half or quarter
- o There is no subdivision of beats, but use of simple ties
- o Techniques include ring, shoulder damp, SK, TD, echo, martellato, SW, RT
- There are no bell changes (accidentals)
- o Dynamic levels go from pp to ff, but with all ringing at the same level
- o Limited use of crescendo or diminuendo
- Tempo is limited to slow to moderate

Level 2

- All Level 1 criteria plus:
- Meter can be 2/2, 3/2, cut time, and simple mixed meters of 2/4, 3/4, and 4/4
- Note and rest values include eighths, the dotted quarter followed by an eighth, simple combinations of eighths and quarters
- Rhythmic elements can include simple syncopation patterns such as eighth-quarter-eighth, and pick-up notes or upbeats
- Techniques can include table damp, pluck, martellato-lift, malleting, and combination of two different techniques
- o There may be a limited number of changes per ringer
- Dynamic levels include crescendo and diminuendo polyphonic style with simple dynamic contrasts (such as two voices ringing at different dynamic levels)
- o Tempo remains slow to moderate

Level 3

- All Level 1 and 2 criteria, plus:
- Meter can be 6/8, 3/4 (in one pulse/measure), 3/8, 9/8, 12/8, 6/4
- Note and rest values can include sixteenth, dotted-eighth and sixteenth note patterns and triplets
- o There can be more complicated syncopation
- There can be a moderate number of bell changes per ringer
- All Level 1 and 2 techniques may appear in combination, but not more than two per measure
- More variety in dynamic levels
- Can include accents
- Tempo ranges from slow to fast, with some changes of tempo within the work

Level 4

- All Level 3 criteria, plus:
- Mixed meters of 6/8 and 3/4, 5/4
- All of the previous note and/or rest values, at faster tempi, triplet over two beats
- More complex syncopation, using sixteenth notes and ties
- Brush damp
- Extensive number of bell/chime changes per ringer
- o Combination of articulation techniques in eighth-note patterns at moderate tempi
- Dynamic changes from subito piano or subito forte without rest, more complex polyphony with more than two independent voices, more rapid shifts of dynamic levels

Level 5

- All Level 4 criteria, plus:
- Irregular meters
- o Dotted rhythms in compound meters at fast tempi, duples against triples
- More complex syncopation, mixed patterns

- o Ring-hook-damp sequences, handbell passes at moderate tempi.
- Unlimited bell/chime changes
- Any combination of articulation at faster tempi
- Rapid shifts between dynamic levels with no preparation, more frequent use of crescendo and decrescendo
- More changes of tempo within the work, including abrupt shifts

STUDENT BURSARY

For our young delegates wishing to attend Spring Ring 2025, BCGEHR offers a student bursary. Applicants must be a current member of BCGEHR or under the direction of a BCGEHR member, and actively involved in handbell ringing for a minimum of two years. They must be between 13 and 24 years of age and attending school or a post-secondary institution. They must be recommended by their handbell director or teacher with an accompanying reference letter.

Applicants should submit their letters of request including name, age, grade, school/church/community choir, name of Director and description of their handbell experience and reason for applying.

Application deadline is February 15, 2025 and should be submitted by email to: secretary@bcgehr.com.

You will be contacted about your successful application by March 3, 2025.

CHAPERONES

Each student group requires one adult chaperone per 5 students. The registration charge for the chaperone is \$65 and includes all meals/snacks that are being provided for the ringers.

WORKSHOPS

If you are arriving on Friday before 1:00 pm you can attend up to six (6) workshops over the two days. Friday afternoon includes three (3) workshop sessions and Friday evening has opening ceremonies, mass ringing and levels ringing rehearsals. For those arriving by noon on Friday, please choose eight (8) workshops in order of preference (you will be placed in six (6) workshops according to preference and availability).

If you arrive on Friday in time for the Opening Ceremonies or later, there are three (3) workshops to attend on Saturday. For those arriving later on Friday or on Saturday morning,

please choose five (5) workshops in order of preference (you will be placed in three (3) workshops according to preference and availability). Every attempt will be made to accommodate your top choices.

Many workshops will be offered twice during Spring Ring in an attempt to accommodate all registrants. The sooner your registration arrives the more likely you are to receive your top workshop choices.

The workshops are as follows:

- **6. Circle Drumming.......Ann Dorval, Vernon, BC**Drumming together in a group setting is magical. In Ann's workshop you will learn some basic techniques and some rhythm patterns on West African djembe drums. Once these drum basics

are in place, participants will be encouraged to do some improvising in groups and maybe even do some soloing! Drums and other percussion instruments will be available for this workshop. Ann Dorval studied music at Douglas College and UBC where she earned her Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Education. She delights in sharing music and drumming with all ages, from babies and toddlers right up to teens and adults. Let's make some music together!

- 7. Bass Bells......Mary Hampton, Maple Ridge, BC Bass bells provide the foundation for the piece the ringers are performing. Playing the bass bells allows a ringer to have fun with techniques like weaving, marts, plucks, use of mallets and more. Come and give bass bells a try!
- 8. Four In Hand.......Peggy Bensler, Kelowna, BC An overview of the various methods for ringing four-in-hand, and their relative merits. No previous 4-i-h experience necessary.
- 9. Weaving Simplified.......Peggy Bensler, Kelowna, BC A fun way to enjoy learning or reviewing weaving techniques for 3 and 4 bells.
- 10. Read and Ring......Handbells, Etc., Edmonton, AB This Read and Ring workshop will give ringers and directors an opportunity to explore some of the latest handbell music published. Music will be a mixture of sacred, secular and original compositions and will be at a level 2 or 3. "Don't forget to bring your gloves!"
- 11. New and Fun Techniques to Try.....Anne Hill, Victoria, BC This session provides you an opportunity to play some fun and new techniques that will add so much interest to your musical presentation. Together we will work on advanced techniques including echo, gyro, martellato, controlled crescendo and decrescendo, and pluck. We will then do a deep dive into techniques for using mallets, singing bell, and Klocken Carta in performance. Knowing what these techniques look like in the music and being able to play them correctly is our focus. Come and give them a try!
- 12. Ringing in a Choir: Creating the Big Picture (All Levels) ... Janine Carscadden, Armstrong, BC This workshop will offer a refresher on some basic handbell ringing techniques, playing with dynamics, damping for tricky rhythms, common notations and when to know when it's you or the bell that needs adjusting! It will also focus on such skills as listening beyond your specific notes, hearing the whole phrase and understanding your part in it, trusting your own musicianship, and having a cool head, warm heart and remembering to smile.
- 13. We're Having a Ball! (All Levels) Jan Nordstrand, Port Moody, BC Let's build our skills without using any bells. Come play some games with balls, bean bags and cups to help develop your eye/hand coordination, rhythm reading and keeping the beat.
